




Measuring our research contributions

- Demonstrated growth in:
 - publications and citations
 - grant success
 - industry investment in research
 - media and community engagement to share research findings
 - academic rankings.
- Increased staff and patient involvement in research and clinical trials.
- Education and mentorship programs for junior staff introducing them to clinical and preclinical research careers.

- A greater proportion of staff active in clinical and preclinical research.
- Increased clinical research positions.
- Improvements in how our research is valued.
- Increased community and patient involvement in SMHS research projects.
- Healthier local communities with improved health literacy through their partnership in research.

Our pillars of change



Community

An engaged community participating in innovative research

By 2033, communities will be actively engaged in SMHS research through:

- an explicit focus on building research literacy across our community, where everyone contributes and creates opportunities to share findings and the value of research to our community
- it being the 'norm' for patients and families to ask, "How can I assist with research into my condition to help the next generation walk a better journey, with a better future?"
- the adoption of a whole-of-community focus to research, including prioritising groups currently under-represented in decision-making about research priorities (e.g. Aboriginal people, culturally and linguistically diverse (CaLD) communities, refugees, people with mental illness)
- SMHS being known as a world leading research health service offering innovative care to patients and a culture that values, promotes and welcomes community engagement

- research focussed on health, disease prevention and social determinants underpinned by an understanding of our whole community
- development of seamless pathways that enable productive connections with communities and primary care providers.




Collaboration

A collaborative research ecosystem that attracts funding and achieves impact within and beyond the SMHS catchment

By 2033, SMHS will be part of a collaborative ecosystem that:

- energises an active culture of engagement and true strategic partnerships in pursuit of cutting-edge innovations
- creates impact beyond the SMHS catchment through partnerships with universities, industry and other health service providers (HSPs) to develop a more flexible funding structure
- has potential partners asking, "How can we find a way to work with SMHS"?
- strengthens interdisciplinary connections and collaboration locally, nationally and internationally
- has a thriving research foundation and an established SMHS Centre for Health and Medical Research and Clinical Education.



Culture

An inclusive research culture fostering curiosity

By 2033, our SMHS research culture will:

- be a principal recruitment driver for clinicians, empowering them to achieve by creating capacity and capability to undertake research
- be exemplified by inquisitive minds and everyone asking, "How we can do this better?", with every clinician supported and encouraged to incorporate research in their daily activities
- encourage and support opportunities for pragmatic clinical and applied research, as well as supporting translational/ implementation science

- actively pursue research career pathways for aspiring clinical researchers with flexibility to engage with other researchers, universities and research institutes and support formal research training
- support SMHS researchers in nationally and internationally competitive grant submissions and panels, working collaboratively to improve funding success, and orchestrating key partnerships at a systems level.



Data

Researchers and clinicians empowered by accessible and available data

By 2033, SMHS will have:

- invested in digitally accessible health research data
- clinicians and researchers who embrace the ability to pull large population data from an electronic medical record (or similar) and generate hypotheses, identify groups of interest, and analyse clinical and quality of life outcomes
- streamlined global e-consent for SMHS patients
- established an ethical, regulated SMHS biobank with infrastructure and support for clinicians and researchers to partner samples with clinical data to facilitate translational research.





Support

Infrastructure and 'can-do' support for researchers in SMHS


By 2033, SMHS will be:

- getting the basics right and making it easy to do research
- known for our 'can do / yes' approach to supporting researchers
- known for our high ethics and high integrity, with research that can be relied upon whilst still finding ways to simplify research processes and governance
- investing in attracting and growing clinician research capacity
- maximising the strength, network and experience of senior SMHS researchers to mentor and coach potential and upcoming researchers
- promoting and resourcing areas of research excellence and success



- partnering with organisations outside of the SMHS community
- ensuring community involvement in research co-design is valued and genuine.
